In this long awaited monograph, Elizabeth Opalenik gives her enthusiastic audience a real treat. These luscious and sensual images reflect Opalenik's unique signature style which she has developed over her 25 year career. This book showcases images from her series of mordançage nudes and portraits.

In mordançage, the French word for the technique named and developed by Jean Pierre Sudre, the silver emulsion is chemically lifted, removed or rearranged in the shadow areas of the silver print. The delicate floating veils are Opalenik's contribution to this time consuming process for which she is considered one of the world masters. The images that result from the mordançage process are truly one-of-a-kind. They can never be repeated.

In addition, this book brings together some of Opalenik's stunning nude and flower images involving the sensual, mysterious qualities of water. Every once in a while, an artist comes around that has a truly distinctive way of using materials in a fresh new way. Opalenik is one of these artists. Her work connects us with layers of the worlds that often go unnoticed.
